National Squash Club Championship Finals 2023

This past weekend Roehampton Club Men's, Ladies' and Over 35s national teams made their way to sunny Sheffield to compete in the National Club Championships, hosted by Hallamshire Club.

The Ladies' Team played local Surrey club Surbiton in the semi-final and this match against a very strong team proved to be the most difficult.

Katie was first on and although the game scores seemed comfortable the rallies and match proved tricky, but Katie's quality and speed of movement proved too strong, winning the match 3-0.

Tez had made the short trip across from the Manchester Open having sadly lost the night before to play against Welsh national teammate Emily. This saw Welsh number one Tez against Welsh number two Emily. It was the perfect match for Tez to forget about the night before. A slow start by Tez and we were wondering if fatigue may be an issue. No chance as a tough battle ensued and Tez's quality of shot proved too good. After winning a close first game Tez never looked back to win 3-0.

Jazz, having also made the short trip after competing in Manchester gave a professional performance of concentration and shot selection. Well, a slight lapse in concentration to lose the third game but the result was never in doubt as Jazz reasserted her authority and quality in the fourth game. **Roehampton Club beat Surbiton 3-0.**

The match got off to the perfect start with Nathan, world 32, delivering a top professional performance of how to beat a very dangerous player, George Parker world number 43, by giving him no route into the match. Nathan's tight width and correct shot choice nearly every time would frustrate George into a combination of mistakes or just not physically being able to get to the ball. Nathan did not let up for three games, an underestimate skill.



Adrian was against a tricky opponent in Simon Herbert. There were times when the rallies were frustrating Adrian with the movement patterns but when it mattered, Adrian remained calm and used his deception to get over the line.

Joe had a tough first game and it looked like the match result could have gone either way to those watching. In reality Joe had made Elliott work so hard for the first game he had nearly broken him. An added bonus for Joe was he also gave his body time to get used to the fast-paced squash. An increase in errors from Elliott and perfect placement of the ball from Joe saw the next three games go Joe's way.

Jonah showed maturity beyond his 17 years as he looked in control of his match from the outset. His speed and ball retrieval as the kidz would say 'is a joke'. As he develops his game to use this as a strength more than to retrieve it shows why he has all the attributes to go very high in the professional rankings. A little too many errors in the second game gave his opponent a glimmer of hope but this was quickly extinguished with quality squash in the next two games **Roehampton Club beat Edgbaston 4-0.**

The third game was close but a few too many 'flicks' at the front of the court mid-way through the game saw Satomi lose her depth of shot and control of the rallies. Millie took full advantage to take the third game against a tiring Satomi. Some wise words in between games from 'coach' Jazz, helpfully assisted by me, saw Satomi refocus and not allow Millie to control the middle of the court. Satomi won the fourth game and the match 11/5.

Katie went on against Kiera, and while favourite on paper to win it would prove to be a test of patience. A slow start to settle into the match on a warm court, added to with Kiera playing well, Katie had to work hard for every point. This is exactly what Katie did, again with wonderful advice from Jazz, and after a very close first game Katie was just too good winning the match 3-0 and meaning Roehampton Club had retained the Ladies' National Club Championship title.

Although the result was now immaterial Jazz went on court to play Yasshmita in a best of three. No coaching required in between games for Jazz as she quickly dispatched of Yasshmita while treating the watching crowd to some wonderful winning shots.

Adrian's match was nothing short of world class against a top-class opponent. The match was fast, free flowing and like gladiators delivering near knockout punches they both kept getting back up. Adrian is the perfect team player, even two games down he knew the importance of the format and scoring. Each game could be vital, even points. His effort and desire to help the team was maxed out getting back to two games all with each game score so close. Gutting to lose 3-2 but it would prove to be huge overall. Jonah, against Josh was always intriguing. Josh can win a match as quick as Ronnie O'Sullivan wins a snooker frame. Jonah on the other hand can get to nearly any ball on the court. What stood out though was a fist pump in later games, the care and pride he showed to help the Club and team try get a result. An unbelievable deciding game in which two players had given everything but Jonah crucially won.

Joe followed Jonah on court (Adrian was still battling away on the other court). Joe has been with us since the start of our national club journey and as with Adrian his experience and knowledge is invaluable. Joe might be a quietish character but when he speaks you listen ... he wants to make others better, his passion, knowledge of and enthusiasm for the sport is as good as anyone. Lucky for him I was there in between games to help him. An unusual first game that while Joe didn't do anything wrong, he also hadn't really done that much right to have won so easy. Advice, do the same

but be prepared it should get tougher. It never did. Joe quietly dismantled his opponent winning the tough battles when asked and playing the quality shots when opportunity presented.

Charlie had just got on court before Joe had won, not knowing the game scores. Charlie had a slight injury but his willingness to play the match for the team and Club showed why he is so important; without Charlie we would not have had the same opportunity to fight for the title. Although we were 2-1 up matches, Charlie might need to win a game to get the team victory and with this he gave his all to get over the line. A close first game went Surbiton's way and although Charlie knew Joe had won, the team still needed that game for the title. Another close second game went the way of Surbiton. Some quick maths by Steve Richardson assisted by Dave Newman who has a PHD in 'Quantum Thermodynamics in the strong coupling regime' (he's OK with numbers) meant we had retained the title by virtue of points on countback even if Charlie didn't win.
